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Schrock, I assure you that I will try. Usually when we have a LB 775 bill on the floor, Senator Chambers gets to it first and there's about a hundred amendments filed on there, so I've never had the opportunity. One thing I will tell you, Senator Schrock, and it's a very good question, but I have worked with LB 775 recipients in Omaha, and I think if you ask around you'll verify this, but particularly Union Pacific, they use probably 90 or 95 percent of Nebraska workers to do their...to do their facility, their new headquarters that they qualified for LB 620. Now, I'll be honest with you, and I've got to talk with the UP lobbyist about this, but I heard just the other day that they hired a non-Nebraska contractor to do some fitness room work or something, and I'm going to visit with them about that. But I will tell you, largely the plant that comes to mind or the facility that comes to mind that most recently used incentives is Union Pacific, and they have done a fantastic job of using Nebraska labor. I don't know if they did that so that we wouldn't put a Nebraska labor amendment on LB 775, I don't know, but I can tell you they've done a great job of doing that. I've also worked with, to be honest with you since I have a minute, I've worked with the University of Nebraska.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: They've built I don't know how many facilities up there, and they're not even using tax money. They're using trust money and that. And they have used probably 90-95 percent Nebraska workers to build their latest research plant, which is about a \$70 million building. They used 90-95 percent Nebraska-based contractors. So the Med Center has done a fantastic job as well, as has the entire university system in using Nebraska labor. I've spoken with each and every one of them prior to them letting out the bids, saying, hey, it's really important that we use Nebraska people; we need to maximize LB 775 money, we need to maximize our incentive programs, this is how we do it. They have agreed, without being forced into doing it. Now I've been talking to the ethanol people and Loran Schmit has helped set up meetings with the ethanol people to accomplish the same thing, and my sense is they've turned an ear...a deaf ear to me and other people, Senator Cunningham and those other folks that have advocated for
