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because...

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Schrock, would you yield?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: As I understand it, Senator Schrock, there are two types of ethanol plants. One is the wet mill. The other one is the dry mill. And as I understand it, the two more efficient plants in the state are the wet. That's the one at Columbus and the one at Blair. Question is, what is the difference, and the second thing is, if those are the more efficient plants, why don't we have two levels of incentives, one for the one plant, the wet plants, and one for the dry plants? Senator Schrock, and then would you, after you talk, then we could give the rest of the time to Senator Beutler.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Hartnett, you are correct, there are two different kinds of plants. The wet mill plant is a lot more complicated. I think it costs a lot more to construct. Those two plants happen to be bigger. They produce a lot more variety of products, where the dry mill plants just grind out ethanol and feed by-products for livestock. That's the difference. I don't know why there isn't two. I don't know that other states have two different levels of incentives, so that's something that would be good to look at. With that, why, I...that's the best I can come up with for an answer. And Senator Beutler can have the rest of my time. Did I answer your question, Senator Hartnett? I guess I do have, while Senator Beutler is going to his mike, I would like to ask a question. If we require that they allow Nebraska companies to bid on these plants, and I'm not a lawyer but if somebody has the answer let me know, doesn't that bring up the interstate commerce clause? Do we have a problem there? I don't know the answer, but it did ring a bell up here and so I'm asking my question. Senator Beutler, I'm done if you want the rest of the time.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Schrock, did you yield the rest of your time to someone?

SENATOR SCHROCK: He didn't want it.
