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interesting positions on this issue, which definitely does include the debate today. And I would like to read with you some of the issues that they pointed out. First of all, it says, in fact, the current University of Nebraska policy prohibits therapeutic cloning. September 7, 2001, the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska formally endorsed the recommendations of human stem cell research. So here's what their policy stated, and this is what the University of Nebraska's now official policy is. Quote, the University of Nebraska should not conduct research involving the derivation or use of human embryonic stem cells from embryos produced using somatic cell nuclear transfer. Recommendation number three. Here's recommendation number two. Quote, the University of Nebraska should not conduct research involving the derivation of human embryonic stem cells from embryos produced solely, produced solely for research purposes using in vitro fertilization. Also, the committee's report says this. Quote, the committee adhered to the recommendations of the National Bioethics Advisory Commission regarding the sources of human embryonic stem cells. Cells the University of Nebraska should utilize: human embryonic stem cells from the embryos made solely for research purposes are rejected, as well as human embryonic stem cells from embryos produced using somatic cell nuclear transfer, i.e., cloning. Comes from page 11 of their recommendation. So what are we as a body being asked to do? We're being asked to simply take what the University of Nebraska Board of Regents has adopted as their public policy. I think that's a realistic goal. I don't think that in any way shows that the Legislature has shown any disdain or lack of interest in the discussion in the society about this issue, whether it be pro or con, benefit or drawback. I don't think that does any of the sort. What we are doing today is recognizing the work done by many individuals. Granted, it came out of the research done on previous bills that have come before this Legislature. However, the group stepped into the next boundary,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR ERDMAN: ...and has said, we're going to take a position beyond this, but it also includes cloning. Here's why I think this also needs to be done from this...from the Legislature. We
