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July 2002. And their report, the majority recommendation was a ban on cloning to produce children, combined with a four-year moratorium on cloning for biomedical research. I think the one thing that is clear in whatever poll you take, and when you even discuss these issues with the people who are promoting therapeutic cloning, is that there is universal agreement that there should be an outright ban on cloning for reproductive purposes. The question is on what is called therapeutic cloning. Senator Brown made an argument yesterday, and she told us that scientists do not agree, that they are still debating the issue, that, in fact, science has run ahead of ethics, that there are too many questions out there, too many unresolved questions for us to move forward, except with a great deal of caution. She counseled us that we move slowly. And that is exactly what LB 602 is about. It is about saying that we should hold the line until those questions are answered, that we should find agreement before we make a mistake and move forward with science beyond the realm of ethics. I think the recommendation that is before us from the commission is sound. They're saying, let's put a moratorium on it, let's wait and see, let's decide these questions, let's let the people decide before we plunge ahead and make a mistake that we cannot retract. It is an ethical question. It's an ethical question that has not been decided by the majority of Americans. But certainly there is 100 percent agreement on the fact that human cloning should be banned for reproductive measures. I think that LB 602 addresses that. It addresses holding the line until we decide on these other issues. Thank you, Mr. President.
