I apologize to Senator Smith for making that remark. I think even more so, I need to apologize to myself, because one of the things that I value is my own integrity. And so what I am going to try and do here today is to approach this from one of sincere integrity. I realize that people have different views...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JOHNSON: ...on this. But I want to go through and answer just a few of the questions in the time I have here. First of all, Senator Friend brought up the question, or statement, that advances in science are often accidents or serendipitous. We agree wholeheartedly. That's what this argument is about. We need to provide the opportunity for our scientists to find these accidents, to find these serendipitous ways of doing things. This is a common thing that happens. Senator Erdman, the regents' policy is working. Why do we need to change it? Things are going along just fine right now. I stated this yesterday. Why did it happen? But you said, we're simply going to take this policy and put it into law.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Once it's in law, it's there. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Senator Schimek, followed by Senator Vrtiska and others.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members. I'd like to yield my time to Senator...or, Senator Johnson. I was debating whether it was Senator or Doctor, I guess. (Laugh)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Johnson, you have almost five minutes.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Thank you, Senator. Let's finish off on just a few of the things that were said by previous speakers. Senator Foley, you had the question about my report compared to yours, and that there were all kinds of things said in your report that weren't in mine.
