Thompson mentioned earlier that she had a concern about the "any product derived from" clause on the second page of the bill. And I will assure you that it is my twofold effort to make sure that we amend that out to hopefully alleviate your concerns. I'm not sure if that will bring you on board or not, but certainly I want to be sensitive to that issue. And I also want to continue from when I spoke earlier about the article from the Center for Bioethics and Human Dignity--it's not an arm of a church; in fact, it has an affiliation with the Mayo Clinic--where they said, we believe that harms...that the human harms cloning would bring to medicine would exceed the anticipated benefits. And it's easy to say that right now, because the benefits from therapeutic cloning are approximately zero. They go on to say that human cloning would signify an egregious disrespect for personal autonomy. And we can go into the science of all this, and I think we can pretty much all agree on the science of the somatic cell nuclear transfer, and when you need an egg, and you take an enucleated egg and another cell and basically swap out the nucleus, and then bring about an embryo. The embryo produces the stem cells. Stem cells are what everyone is after, saying that they're much more flexible than adult stem cells. And adult stem cells doesn't mean a cell from a person older than 18; it means...adult means any cell from someone following the exit from the birth canal. The issues that we look at...I mean, it concerns me a little bit when the rhetoric hypes up and says that LB 602 is a ban on knowledge. That's not what it's about. Let's keep to the issue at hand here. Nowhere does it ban knowledge. In fact, it promotes research in multiple directions. Right now...and the opponents of LB 602 want to head down one road for research, and I submit that LB 602 would force more roads to be built along the way of research. And I have stacks and stacks of paper here, and I don't want to bore anyone, but there are many, many secular arguments that are made, such as the one from the affiliates of the Mayo Clinic, that say they believe the harms human cloning would bring to medicine would exceed the anticipated benefits.
