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that I made yesterday that we were criminalizing knowledge, and something that Senator Johnson just said in response to Senator Redfield is the reason I believe that. If we were just talking about what Senator Maxwell referred to, in terms of growing cells to be used for therapy, I might even be gettable on this issue. That, to me, is not where we're going to end up, because it is not...it's not the place that is going to be the most effective, in my regard. I think what we...where we're going to end up is finding out how the messages that Senator Chambers talked about are directed to ourselves so that we can get cells to do what we need them to do. Understanding that messaging, and I believe that having research in this area will very much help us understand that, is critical. We talk about stem cells, but I'm not sure that we fully define them. Stem cells are cells that...adult stem cells are cells that have begun the process of differentiation. They may know that they're going to be like a blood cell, but they haven't defined themselves so far that we know what kind of a blood cell. There is promise, very real promise, that we can get them not only to be blood cells of different types, but maybe even to be cell...other cells of different types, but we have to know how that messaging goes on. Now, how might we arrive at knowing that? Not in generating embryonic cells from...with the nuclear makeup of the individual to be used on that person as a therapy, as Senator Maxwell suggested, but rather how does a cell, an adult stem cell that's already partially programmed, how is it biochemically different than an embryonic stem cell with the same nuclear makeup? And when you make that comparison, that is knowledge, and it is the kind of knowledge that will cause us not to go where Senator Maxwell says we're going to go,...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...but to be able to use the cells, the adult stem cells, of a person to fight off diseases, to renew organs that are disintegrating. That is knowledge and that is where we need to continue to go, and I think by continuing to go there we will actually avoid going where Senator Maxwell had suggested. Thank you.
