That's all I would like to say at this point.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I was going to turn the rest of my time over to Senator Johnson, but I don't believe there's enough time for him to make use of that. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body. This is my priority bill and I have not spoken on the issue yet so far this legislative session. I'm in...I stand in opposition to remit back to the committee, and I am in full support of the bill. One of the things that I have been really mulling through my mind, and it really comes off of the discussion that Senator Schimek has just talked about. You know, I'm sure there's everyone, you know, does not want to have human cloning, but I would like to engage in a little conversation with Senator Smith.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Can you give me a few of the details? You know, everyone is saying that we should not have human cloning, reproductive cloning. Tell me the difference between the reproductive cloning and the therapeutic cloning as far as how they are started. Is there a difference, and what would that be?

SENATOR SMITH: Senator Stuthman, there's no difference in how they're started. It's just that reproductive cloning carries it further with the intent of a live birth, whereas therapeutic cloning catches it earlier, kills it earlier, takes out the cells. And there's some concern about the, line 3, about the cells, you know, if a doctor had...or, I'm sorry, line 7 on page 2, if a doctor had some cells separate from an embryo, whether that doctor would be guilty of a crime. And I don't see how that could be because this specifically says embryo. We're
