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SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what is a human organism? Would one of my bone cells be a human organism?

SENATOR SMITH: I don't believe so.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: An organism is more than just a single cell?

SENATOR SMITH: If I understand you correctly, Senator, I mean something can live or it can be considered living whether it can live on its own or not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you take a high school biology course?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you study single-celled organisms?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So an organism can consist of one cell.

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...one of my cells could constitute a human organism. Is that true or false?

SENATOR SMITH: I believe that would be true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Mr. President, I know that I cannot continue what I'm trying to get at in the one minute, and I will not consent to being terminated at this point in my discussion, so I am going to follow the tactics of my antiabortion friends and offer an antiabortion amendment or motion. It will be one to prevent the aborting of my discussion, which I have not engaged in thus far. But that motion will come after this vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
