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SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. Speaker. Yes, Senator Chambers, that's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you rather I ask you questions about this, or Senator Smith?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Well, I can't pass that up. I think I'd rather have you ask Senator Smith.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I'd like to ask Senator Smith a question or two, since it is his bill and he's had legal counsel on the language in this amendment.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Smith, would you yield, please?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Smith, there is peculiar language in line 23 on page 1. The language that seems peculiar to me is the following: "an existing or previously existing human organism." What does that mean, "an existing or previously existing"?

SENATOR SMITH: Senator Chambers, I'm just enlightened to know that you actually find something peculiar. I'm surprised.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Okay. What does that...what does that mean, if you know?

SENATOR SMITH: "Previously existing"? It means exactly what it says, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what does it mean, though? Could it be a Neanderthal? What do you mean in your...now, if you don't want to answer just tell me, but I think I should ask the one whose bill it is.

SENATOR SMITH: That's fair.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what do you mean when you use the language
