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is alive or that which is dead? I'm trying to get at whether or not that's what it's referring to, or if it's referring to something different from simply (inaudible)...

SENATOR SMITH: Are you trying to make the bill better so as to eventually support it?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I'm trying to understand what it means so I can know what I ought to base my opposition on.

SENATOR SMITH: (Laugh)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I didn't put the language there. I am not defending the language; you are.

SENATOR SMITH: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you'll get information on "previously existing," apparently. Would you turn to page 2?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, in line 2, starting in line 2, we talk about something being "derived from a living or deceased human body at any stage of development." Could this human body be less than a fully-formed human being, such as myself and yourself? Could it be an embryo?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: A dead embryo would be considered a human body, is that true, based on your meaning of this language, because you're defining it?

SENATOR SMITH: Well, it says "obtained or derived from a living or deceased human body at any..."

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And to...
