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SENATOR SMITH: No, but it's my understanding that case law has derived that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Smith, if I run and jump over this desk, I have succeeded in jumping over the desk. If I run and I jump, but my foot catches and I don't clear the desk, are both of those acts the same? Jumping and attempting to jump are both the same, that's what your legal people told you?

SENATOR SMITH: Could we try it out?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I think this is something we can reason to without having to do it. You know that the attempt to do something is different from doing it, don't you? Is making your wife pregnant the same as attempting to make her pregnant? The attempt doesn't succeed. Is that the same as making her pregnant?

SENATOR SMITH: Probably not in that sense.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Probably? Oh, you're not married, are you?

SENATOR SMITH: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Young man, you got a little learning to do before that happens, so let's talk before you make that decision. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BRÖMM: Time. (Visitors introduced.) Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a priority motion. Senator Smith would move to invoke cloture.

SPEAKER BRÖMM: Chair finds that the opportunity for full debate has been accorded, over six and a half hours at this point. With that, we will proceed with the cloture vote. Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Ask for a call of the house, please.
