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SENATOR MOSSEY: According to the bill, once it's determined to be a criminal matter, everything stops and criminal proceedings start. So, yes, what I'm saying is once the investigation starts and it's determined to be a criminal issue, criminal matter, the investigation stops and it moves on with criminal proceedings.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But an administrative proceeding is started, even when they know that a cop has killed somebody. There is an administrative proceeding that is initiated, isn't that true?

SENATOR MOSSEY: Yes, there would have to be.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR MOSSEY: There has to be (inaudible) started.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now, you said there are false complaints filed against police officers.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have police officers ever filed false charges against citizens? Thank you.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Probably.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Mossey. Members of the Legislature, I want you all to see what we're dealing with, when our resident expert speaks. I've talked to some people off the floor, and they forget what they admit to me. But whether he admits it here or not, I know and he knows and everybody on this floor knows. And there are some cops who have been fired because they've falsified charges against people, and went even beyond that, were involved in criminal conduct besides. What Senator Synowiecki does not want to deal with, nor Senator Mossey, the substantive issues I've raised about trying to put cops in a position above everybody else's. Who in this society has the discretionary authority to kill somebody, without conviction, judge, or jury? Only a cop. And they're supposed to be given special consideration above everybody else? This
