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SENATOR MOSSEY: Thank you, Mr. President. I'll finish responding to Senator Chambers' question about false allegations by officers. That's exactly why we're doing this bill. Like any profession, I'll agree, there's officers that shouldn't be officers and officers that do things, and that's why this bill is in place to get rid of those exact officers that Senator Chambers was talking about. If you're making a false allegation, then you shouldn't be a police officer. I'll agree with you on that. That's why the important part of due process and witnesses and testimony is there, so we get rid of those officers that are making the false allegations. So I won't disagree with you on that portion about that, and that's why, if anything, it justifies the need for this bill to get rid of those type of officers. Again, to address Senator Bourne's concern, I, too, am looking at some of the changes made and, once again, part of that was as a result of miscommunications. On Section 5, I believe, where you're talking about, Senator Bourne, about the definition of a peace officer, will you respond to a question? Will Senator Bourne respond to a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Absolutely.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Were you talking about, I just had it, on page 2, line 22?

SENATOR BOURNE: Starting in line 20...

SENATOR MOSSEY: Are you on the green copy or the amendment? I'm sorry.

SENATOR BOURNE: I'm on the green copy, but...

SENATOR MOSSEY: Okay.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...in a quick look, it looks like the amendment and the green copy have the same definition for peace officer.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Uh-huh. Because I'm just going from the
