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amendment and...

SENATOR BOURNE: If I can just interrupt, Senator Mossey,...

SENATOR MOSSEY: Uh-huh.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...I'm sorry, the definition of peace officer is on page 2, line 18.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Okay.

SENATOR BOURNE: And I think the definition of peace officer is the same in both the surprise amendment and in the green copy.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Okay. The part I was going to address about the concern there is in the last lines, 24, 25, and 26, where it says those of the state who are responsible for the prevention and detection of crime and the enforcement of laws of the state. As far as I know, I know of nobody else that's able to enforce laws of the state unless you're a certified law enforcement officer.

SENATOR BOURNE: Right.

SENATOR MOSSEY: I know that might clear up some of it, but, you know, once again, I think there is room between General and Select File to make...to make changes. But Senator Chambers pointed out exactly why we need to pass this bill. He talks about corruptness, and I'm not going to get into conspiracy theories and all that within law enforcement, but just as much as it protects the good officers, it gets rid of the bad officers, and for that reason Senator Chambers makes a point on why we need to not recommit this to committee and advance the bill, for that exact reason. That's...I won't respond to that, unless anything else and I'll respond, and give the rest of my time to Senator Synowiecki, if he would like some time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: About a minute and a half, Senator.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Mossey. I would have kind of liked to direct the conversation. We are...well, we are
