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at least he spoke. Senator Mossey, I've touched on his. Senator Dwite Pedersen, I'm kind of surprised at him, but in a way I guess I shouldn't be. Senator Preister's name shocks me, but his is from the standpoint of being for the underdog, I suppose. And Senator Quandahl, a meticulous lawyer on the issues that concern or interest him, I'm on the committee with him and have heard him discuss certain bills that he has brought before us, and no bill that he has brought to us would have been written as atrociously as this one. He would not have brought us a bill such as this, but I'm surprised that he voted to send this atrocity out here and will not only not defend it, but not try to clean it up. But let me tell you why they're not saying anything. They didn't expect it to come where it is now. But it is here, and Senator Synowiecki ought to keep all their feet to the fire. I think, when...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I look at what my colleagues are doing on this bill...did you say one minute, Madam President?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, I did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think I can say this in a minute. There was a guy. He was...his son was going to have a wedding, and he said go out there and compel people to come in because all those who had been invited, all of them of one accord, began to make excuse. The ones on this bill have made excuse. The ones who supported bringing it out here have made excuse. And I, who am opposed to it and have been opposed to it, have to clean up their mess, but I'm going to undertake that arduous task. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. The next speaker is Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Madam President, members. I wanted to ask Senator Brashear a question. We had talked earlier about what the Judiciary Committee did or didn't do on this bill, and he had indicated that...I don't want to put words in his mouth so I want to go over this again. And the reason I'm asking
