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morning. Mr. Speaker, members, I guess it takes somebody who understands the issue to speak on this, and I'm not one of those people, as you probably know. But Senator Johnson is carrying this and he is certainly qualified to know what it does and what stands for and how it comes about. But there's one thing I do know, we're here for a couple reasons: budget, we have to do the budget; and then we're here for the protection of the people. What's more important? What's more important than protect the innocent? And if this does anything, I heard Senator Johnson allude to that this morning, something about protection of innocent, and it just caught my ear. What's more important than to protect the innocent? Somebody spends 20 years in prison for something that he was accused of and somebody said he did, but didn't know what they were talking about, and he's innocent, think of that. Just think of that. Now if this has however infinitesimal amount of, you know, as a result of that, but if it helps one case, it's worth it. Think of that, it protects the innocent. Nothing worse than spending your life in prison for something you didn't do. Maybe this can even help that. Can I ask Senator Johnson a question, Mr. Speaker, please?

**SPEAKER BROMM:** Senator Johnson, would you yield to a question, please?

**SENATOR JOHNSON:** I'm sorry?

**SPEAKER BROMM:** Senator Johnson, Senator Cudaback would like to ask a question.

**SENATOR JOHNSON:** Certainly.

**SENATOR CUDABACK:** Senator Johnson, would this in any way help protect the fact that there are people who are in prison that are innocent? Could this help solve some of those problems if this passes?

**SENATOR JOHNSON:** It most certainly will, and although, Senator Cudaback, this is relatively in the language of the existing bill, but just about every day you read of some place in the United States where there has been someone that...in fact, there
