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Legislature. First of all, the...as I mentioned in my opening on LB 10...I mean AM1057...make sure I have...yeah, AM1057, not 67...I can't see so well up there on the wall...that the Judiciary Committee has no problem with Senator Johnson's amendment to the committee amendment. I did want to mention that the bill, in general, DNA is used as much for people who are not guilty of crimes as it is for those who are guilty. There has been quite a few, I have not any idea what the number is, but I know there's been quite a few people across the country in the United States have been released from death rows because they were found innocent with DNA. So this is a good bill and I hope you're going to support it. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Is Senator Johnson...if I could ask Senator Johnson a couple questions.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Johnson, would you yield, please?

SENATOR JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

SENATOR RAIKES: Senator, I'm just trying to understand in broad terms where we are now and where we would be if the bill, as you propose it be amended, came to pass.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Okay. Well, I realize it's somewhat confusing and the reason for that is because of the promised federal funding, and what it is is this, and I might say that Senator Beutler's original bill that he submitted was a very comprehensive bill. They used my bill because it was a very basic bill, with the idea of adding to my bill, that that would be easier than subtracting, so to speak. So what we had talked about, there's no question that burglary and robbery convicts are the worst of offenders and the greatest crossover with the violent and sexual offender ones. It's greater than 50 percent where there is this crossover.

SENATOR RAIKES: Let me just stop you there, if I might. So is it the real...the real or the main objective, I should say, is
