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Fund, terraces, you name it, up and down the line, waterways. And it's thought that in these NRDs that contain urban areas, that the ag land probably receives about \$4 of benefits for every \$1 taxes they pay. In other words, a lot of taxes from Omaha have come out to help the farmers in the Missouri Trib NRD. It's my understanding...

SENATOR KREMER: Well, I understand that. I don't want you to take all my time here, so.

SENATOR SCHROCK: All right, so.

SENATOR KREMER: One other thing. I think at the beginning we did exempt schools and churches. Was that correct? On the first draft of the...?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I better not say what we exempted, but we did exempt some. I know the university was one that we exempted.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay. And that has changed now so where we would include all those. I heard someone mention something to me that...a statement made to Senator Raikes. So I'd like to have Senator Raikes come to the mike and ask him a question a little bit.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Raikes, would you respond?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes. Yes.

SENATOR KREMER: I'd like to have you make the statement so that I don't misrepresent you, even though I'd like to do that sometimes. Please tell us the statement that was made to you about what's happened because of all the conservation measures that have been done, and I know you're involved in that in your work, about what's happening as far as the cleanliness of the water and everything, if you would.

SENATOR RAIKES: Well, if I can Senator Chambers...or, excuse me,...is that...no. Senator Kremer. Let me try to background it a little bit. We're talking about conservation practices applied to agricultural land, terraces, where in effect what you
