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Common Cause, because (laugh) they certainly regard my effort with regard to this bill as wrong. I respect that. Mr. Gould and I actually have a very kind of pleasant and respectful conversational relationship. And I want to be absolutely clear, I have a number of friends who are going to oppose me on this bill. You know, this is a disagreement about the substance of something, and that's all. I want to tell you a story about this law to begin with. It's a law with noble ends. Let me tell you what the law itself says. This is the language that we, through our predecessors here in the body, for and on behalf of the people, adopted as the findings. There is a compelling state interest in preserving the integrity of the electoral process in state elections by ensuring that these elections are free from corruption and the appearance of corruption. That's a noble end. It's a high-minded goal, and one with which we would all agree. But, as they sometimes say, there is the rest of the story. This is what this law has done. It took \$125,000 of public money that legally and constitutionally ought to have gone to the school children of Nebraska, and gave it to one candidate for public office. It did this because one candidate knew how to play the game. She was an insider. And her opponent was not an insider and did not know how to play the game that this law creates. In fact, her opponent did not even have the money that was required to be the trigger for the law to do what it did. This candidate then used that money to win a primary, and got elected, and took an oath of office, and was serving the people until such time as she resigned in disgrace following a report that appears to only scratch the surface of a regime of unparalleled incompetence, ignorance, arrogance, and criminality. The only instance of, quote, success of the Campaign Finance Limitation Act, the only time in which it supposedly ensured that the electoral process is free from the appearance of corruption, the only time, the only time was when it provided \$125,000 to bring about the election of Lorelee Byrd as Treasurer of the great state of Nebraska. And that's the first part of the rest of the story. LB 762 would repeal the Campaign Finance Limitation Act outright, and eliminate references to it in the statutes. As I've noted, the motives...my motives behind the CFLA, as we will refer to it, the motives behind CFLA are honorable. I mean that. I'm repeating it. I have a great deal of personal respect for
