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happens to be wealthy isn't necessarily sometimes the best candidate and convinces the voters that they are and they're successful, but...even with their own money. But given an equal opportunity between people who have...who are buying their way into an office, and people who have to solicit support from many others and use volunteers and go door to door, generally the voters seem to prefer the people that do the latter, that are willing to expend time and energy and solicit monies from many, many smaller donors, because naturally they think that that person will be more of an independent thinker down here, and not necessarily prone to one philosophy or any one interest group that they might be obliged to respond to. So I think the campaign finance limitation, whether it be at this level or any level, has some appeal to me, just from standpoint that I think it's more consistent with what Nebraskans really prefer. There are some problems with this act. Senator Beutler has acknowledged those, Senator Brashear has emphasized those, and I think Senator Beutler has tried in some instances to fix some of these flaws, or if some of the limits are not adequate now, I think he's indicated an interest in making adjustments. He would support that, I think, without question. The funding is problematic, and I don't know if the Attorney General's Opinion would be what the court would say or whether it wouldn't, but it's problematic. We do have a constitutional provision that does require that fines go to schools and that is a concern. Now, the fact that there may need to be some adjustments in the act, the fact that an Attorney General says that perhaps we should look at a different funding source does not cause me to want to throw the entire act out and the baby out with the bathwater, so to speak. I would like to see work done on this act to see if it can be improved, to see if there can be loopholes filled, and certainly anybody that doesn't want to abide by the act doesn't have to. I mean, that's the...that's the beauty of this particular act. But people will know that and if they spend an exorbitant amount of money there is a chance that there could be some funding come in...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...to help the person who doesn't have that much money to spend. I would personally like to see this act worked
