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SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...there will be no additions to the fund. I'm sorry, Mr. President, did you call time?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: One minute.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you. Except for this private donation loophole that's being developed, that I pointed out, and of course that can be addressed in more than one way, but the fact of the matter is eventually we will not have sufficient monies. People who can't raise it any other way...and, you know, you do generally raise money through donation because people believe in your objective, your vision, your mission. They know you. They trust you. Whatever it is, that's why people contribute. That's how all of us raise money. Let's don't act like we haven't done it too. And the fact of the matter is the people then who agree to abide and take the public money will eventually exhaust the fund. When the fund is exhausted we're going to have a legal crisis...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Time.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...in terms of...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: You're next.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...what do we do then.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: You are next, Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. The...I would point out that these issues, you know, we don't live in a vacuum. These things actually are going on elsewhere. I've told you about Wisconsin. I've told you about other states where these schemes have failed. Massachusetts had a public finance law. It allowed for, as I recall, \$3.8 million to be spent in attack ads, public funds spent in attack ads. Arizona, I earlier referred to, gave \$1.7 million to somebody who then proceeded to attack an individual of the Mormon faith as being soft on polygamy; great use of \$1.7 million of public funds. We will have to someday be accountable when our fund is
