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information in order to validate that Social Security number. That's what's in, as you said, both the state ID card and the driver's license sections of this bill.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay. Senator, on page 6, beginning on line 19, new language: "Any individual who presents a valid Nebraska operator's license or Nebraska state identification card may present that document for identification for issuance of such license or identification card." Here's what troubles me, the next sentence: but may be required to present additional forms of identification at the discretion of the examiner or county treasurer. Senator, under what circumstances would a clerk at a treasurer's office demand to see additional forms of identification? Under what guidelines would we open this can of worms up, in terms of who is asked for additional identification; who is not?

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Synowiecki, that caused lots of discussion in the committee. That is stricken. That language on page 6, line 22, after "card" there's a period, and then the rest of that language on line 22 and then 23 and 24 is stricken in the committee amendment.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: By your committee amendment?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, sir.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay. Go ahead, Senator.

SENATOR BAKER: Well, to answer...and this is on your time. I don't want to take all your time. But, yes, it does require a Social Security number for issuance of an ID card now, and that's on page 28, line 28. That's not changed. As we've already talked...discussed here, that the new language dealing with Social Security numbers is...it's not a change in the requirements; it's simply a change in the process to access the technology that's available to confirm that that's a valid Social Security number. That's what the new language is on page 29 and 30, and then back in the driver's license section of the green copy of the bill.
