January 28, 2004 LB 559

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Chambers, there are no further lights on at this time. You're recognized to close on your amendment, FA1430, if you care to. He waives the opportunity. The question before the body is adoption of FA1430, offered by Senator Chambers to LB 559. All in favor of the motion vote aye, opposed nay. We're voting on adoption of the floor amendment, FA1430, offered by Senator Chambers to LB 559. Have you all voted who care to? Record please, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Chambers' amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The motion was successful. The Chambers amendment has been adopted. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: I have nothing further at this time, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Back to discussion of advancement of LB 559 itself. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm not going to delay the bill's movement at this point. But I still have not had a chance, really, to examine the language as carefully as I would like to, to satisfy myself that there are not some inadvertent inclusions that ought not to be here. So I am not going to delay it. And since I'm not going to do that and will not take time for that purpose, I'd like to ask Senator Baker a question about something totally unrelated to this bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker, would you respond?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Baker, now, if I get this incorrect, you can stop me. So I wanted to ask you first. Is there a program called STOP, according to which a person who gets a ticket can go take some kind of class and have the citation or whatever it is erased?
