SENATOR SCHROCK: Don't make it too leisurely. It's cold outside.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. (Laugh) I was almost tempted to say something. I'm not going to. In talking about an air pollutant, it says that an air pollutant...the term means particulate matter with a diameter of ten microns or less. How many microns...if we were going to talk about the width or thickness of a human hair, how many microns would it take to span that human hair, if you know?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Chambers, I do not know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if you had given me an answer, I was going to ask you how do you know the thickness of the human hair that I'm talking about, so you gave an excellent answer, Senator Schrock. I think you headed me off at the pass. Now, when we come to line 3, it would...we're talking about sulfur dioxide or sulfur trioxide or any combination of the two. If there were a combination of the two, would that be sulfur "quintoxide"?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Chambers, I cannot answer that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How would they designate the combination, if you know, because I don't?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I don't know the answer to that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. That's all I will ask you, but, Senator Schrock, this morning I couldn't let you get by without asking you something, and that's the only thing I could ask you from this bill, so thank you.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Maybe there's...maybe there's some chemistry people in here that could answer that question. I cannot.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Nor can I. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Stuthman, you are the next in line for speaking.
