SENATOR STUTHMAN: In...on the fiscal note of it, in 2004-2005 the revenue is supposed to be \$87,500. That would be the money that is sent in for these application fees?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That would be the money that the application fees would generate, yes.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: That, to me, it...realistically, is that going to be that many application fees coming in, you know, when the application fee is going to be ranged from anywhere from \$250 to \$3,000? That's going to be a lot of applications for emission released in the air. Could this be realistic or not?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Stuthman, this is the information presented to us by Department of Environmental Quality, and I suppose they must process this many applications every year, so they would know.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: And this will be new applications for facilities.

SENATOR SCHROCK: And I understand there's about a hundred applications that come in per year. I'm sure a lot of those are small.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: If there would be 100 applications at \$2,000, that would be \$200,000, wouldn't it?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Well, if there would be 100 applications at \$250, a small, that would be \$25,000.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: That would be \$25,000. So it just...it just seemed that these figures didn't seem realistic to me and...but I guess it's possible. If there's veterinaries have to, you know, if they're going to install an incinerator, if there's going to be a hog operation that's going to install an incinerator to dispose of the animals, it could be possible. But it just seemed out of order, in my opinion, at the beginning. So I will take it for...for what it is. I do not believe it, but I'll just have to leave it at the present time. Thank you.
