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SENATOR CHAMBERS: How much value do you think that person's opinion is in helping you and I to arrive at an answer to the question of how many microns it would take to go from one side of a human hair to the other, or determine its thickness?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I have no idea, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Nor do I, Senator Schrock, except I will say this. I feel no closer to an answer to my question than I was when I first posed it. And some people might wonder what difference does it make. Now that brings me to something that I saw in "Pogo," Senator Brown. Pogo was talking to this gopher, and this gopher sprang down his hole and then Pogo asked him why they couldn't consider their discussion. So the gopher came back out of the hole to discuss it and Pogo asked him, what was that you told me before you ran down your hole? He said, I'm upset about the federal government spying on me. So Pogo asked, why would the federal government spy on a gopher? And as the gopher shot down his hole again he said, if we knew the answer to that we would all sleep better at night. So if you knew the answer to how many microns it takes...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to traverse a human hair, it may not help you sleep better at night, it may not help you do anything other than have an idea of what is being discussed when people use the human hair as a measuring rod. With the talk of nanoseconds, nano this and nano that, they often will use the human hair as a measuring rod. Sometimes things which seem to have no purpose whatsoever will not have a purpose unless you go beneath the surface and realize that it interplays and interfaces a great deal with things that you may not have thought about. So I hope I've given you all something to think about this morning. Senator Schrock, I appreciate your help and I will support your bill.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Seeing no further lights, Senator Schrock, you are recognized to close on the motion to advance LB 449.
