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who is going to answer the phone. I don't know who is going to see those posters. I don't know what kind of information is going to be given out. And I'm totally opposed to this amendment, absolutely opposed to it. I think the approach of LB 172 is the proper approach. It's been unanimously supported by our Education Committee. We took a cloture vote on this bill; 38 senators voted for it. A couple of senators who I think would have voted for it were absent. I think there was great support for the approach outlined in LB 172 and I'm not willing to compromise on it.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR FOLEY: I think I will just conclude right there, Mr. President, and thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Foley. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm going to support Senator Schimek's amendment. I believe the law ought to be left as it is. As was pointed out during our last debate, Senator Foley, on an issue such as this, has blinders that are narrower than those that are put on a horse which is supposed to plow a straight furrow. I don't think there is any point in trying to reason with him, but I think maybe some of my colleagues will be open to reason. And if they are not, at least our debate is carried not only throughout this state but throughout this country because somebody from California e-mailed a message based on the last debate. Some people commiserate with me because I'm so often on the floor with having to deal with the types of issues I deal with and the narrow-mindedness and the narrowness of some of the people on these issues. Some of them would like to see young women kept barefoot, pregnant, and in the kitchen. I don't believe in that, and I don't see any of them standing up...one thing...let me start that sentence again. Senator Crosby and I used to battle on these same kind of issues, but one thing about Senator Crosby, when it came to legislation related to poor pregnant women who needed medical help, prenatal care, postnatal care, she and I were tighter...well, I won't tell you tighter than what; we were tightly interwoven on that issue. The people who
