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Senator Foley, he said he got...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...38 votes for cloture, we'll see if he does it again.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. I rise to partly respond to Senator Foley because I want to remind him that the Legislature is the one who stuck their nose into this business in the first place when it insisted that we have parental notification. And I think that was a worthy goal that parents be involved in their children's lives. At the same time, the Legislature recognized the fact that there are some families in which a young woman could not go to her parents for one reason or the other. And, Senator Foley, I know you've never been pregnant. I assume you have never been in a family that was dysfunctional in which the father beat the children or the father raped the daughter, or the stepfather or the mother or whatever. We have never been there, those of us on this floor. We don't have any clue as to what kind of terror that young woman must feel when she finds out that she is pregnant, and that's what this effort is all about. And the bill that you have introduced is going to leave that young woman without the kind of information that she needs to protect herself. And I think that it is wrong, wrong, wrong to pass this bill, and that's why I am doing what I am today. I don't normally engage in this kind of thing, but I'm committed to raising the issue today to have the Legislature stop and think about what it's doing and have some empathy for that young woman. I'd like to read you a letter from a teacher that I got this week. This teacher comes from the northern part of the state, not my district. Teacher says to me, I wish to offer my perspective on what I heard the last two days. To me a reasonable compromise would be the following; you and Senator Chambers would like the current notification to stay in place. Senator Foley would like to have notification requirement removed and suggests that if a student wants information that would not preclude the school from providing the information. What I'd suggest would be that
