announcement--they even do programs on it--dealing with abuse, abuse of children, abuse of spouses, abuse of siblings. And they will flash on the screen an "800" number you can call, or some agency that you can contact. But you don't see advertisements on television explaining to young women how they can obtain a judicial waiver. First of all, you could not do it nationally, because not every state requires of these young women what Nebraska requires. So what is being done with the existing law on the books is to address an existing evil. Senator Maxwell is in the school of those who don't believe that under any circumstances a person should be allowed to obtain an abortion. And that's, as I stated earlier, their privilege, their prerogative. But these young women that I have a concern for need a way out. Now, I think I may have heard Senator Maxwell say I'm wrong. Mr. President, I'd like to ask Senator Maxwell a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Maxwell, would you respond?

SENATOR MAXWELL: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Maxwell, did I hear you say that I'm wrong?

SENATOR MAXWELL: You are mistaken. You said that I would permit no exceptions for abortion. That's why I didn't get an endorsement from a major pro-life group, Senator Chambers, because I was willing to consider compromises.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So under what circumstances would you agree to an exception?

SENATOR MAXWELL: A threat to the mother's life. And I said I would also allow an exception for rape or incest if that would guarantee an agreement to prohibit other abortions.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, let us say that a young woman was in a situation where her father impregnated her.

SENATOR MAXWELL: That's incest.
