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teacher is required to inform the authorities, and at that point what kicks in is that there is an investigation of the parents and the family. And at that point it can be very dangerous for that young person. I think that your idea is good. I don't have a problem with that. But I think that the young woman, in this case, has a particular circumstance, and I don't agree that she should get her information from a newspaper ad, from an abortion clinic, from any other source, from the yellow pages, from the Internet, whatever. I don't know that I think that kind of information is always unbiased and reliable. I think that there is a certain level of trust that goes with having that information provided by the school system. They are seen as a neutral body. There are people in that school that are seen as father figures, mother figures, whatever. There are people in those schools that those students can trust. And I want them to be in a situation where they can, if necessary, talk to somebody, rather than sitting at a computer, which is a very sterile kind of thing, and getting that information. I know this may seem like an unimportant issue to some, but I don't think it's unimportant. I think it's very important. And I don't think that everybody who is on the side of supporting LB 172 is uncaring. I just think that they need to stop and think in this case what the ramifications are. I don't know how to say it any more clearly. I think that we need to find an alternative. If Senator Foley is bound and determined to pass this bill, then I'm left with the only alternative of doing everything I can to prevent this bill from passing. And that means if it takes eight hours on Select File, if it takes eight hours on Final Reading, I'll be here, because I think it's that important an issue. And I think there is room for compromise, not that I want to do it, not that Senator Foley wants to do it, but I don't want to leave those young people without a good source of information. It was the compromise that was put in place in the first instance, and I...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...think it's still good today, and that we should adhere to it. I have spoken with people from the Lincoln Public Schools. I asked Senator Price the other day on the record if she had any phone calls on this issue when she was a
