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anything about the real world, I'll tell you what, if I took them at their word, I would wonder how they could have any children, because they wouldn't know enough to do what it takes to do to have a child, I mean, if they come here like this, so naive, big eyes, and "gee whiz," "gosh fellas," "holy creepers." They know what the real world is, and they know that young people are not going to go to the yellow pages. And I've even had some Senators ask me for information on things that they could go to the yellow pages and find, they could go to the Research Office and find. But if there's somebody in whom they have confidence, they will come to that person. And it happens with me and with my colleagues on this floor. They come to me asking for information. Then they want to deny it to these young women, and say, well, they ought to know. Well, senators are paid to know, but I don't put them off and say, go look in the yellow pages; or, you're paid to know, I know, learn what I know. And they know that. And they know who they are. And it happens on a routine basis. And why do they come to me? Because if I have the information, I will not turn them away. If I'm going to do that with grown people in the area of their job, and the job is one they voluntarily not only sought but argued and fought in order to obtain, and they fought through a campaign to get it, certainly they're telling the public, I'm going to know what I need to know to do this job. But there are things they don't know, and they take the easy way by coming to me. Now, if these people of the world, these grown, experienced people, have to seek information in the area they're paid to be informed on, why are we going to say our young people, especially young women, who are kept in a submissive, subordinate role anyway, going to know things that their parents don't know, that senators on this floor don't know, even after all this discussing we've been doing? It is unreasonable. It borders on the immoral, in my opinion, because it is so hypocritical...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...as to be beneath us. There are things that I believe people have a right to do which I would never do in my life. But because I have set those standards for myself doesn't mean I ought to impose them on other people. I don't
