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believe anybody ought to drink. I don't believe anybody ought to smoke. I don't believe anybody ought to use drugs. But I know a lot of people, and I have friends who do all of those things, and they are not less a friend of mine because they do things which in me would be a flaw. So in this set of circumstances we're discussing, all I want for these young women is access to accurate, reliable information. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Chambers, there are no further lights on. You're recognized to close on your amendment, FA1437, to AM2209.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, my amendment is a simple one. It would change...it would substitute the word "to," t-o, for the word "for," f-o-r. However, it is not essential. I would like you to adopt it, because if we take the amendment then the grammar, in my opinion, will be correct. But if you choose not to adopt it, it's all the same to me, because the main thing is Senator Schimek's amendment. This is one of those instances where I'm accepting and agreeing to something less than what I would like to see. If it were an issue where the only consequences would befall me, I would not yield an inch. But when we're dealing with a subject that relates to the welfare of others, something is better than nothing. If a person is starving, well, the book itself said, to the hungry soul every bitter thing is sweet. To the full soul even honey is a turnoff, but to the hungry soul every bitter thing is sweet. A crust of bread to a senator...and by the way, sometimes senators could be dubbed "Captain Hungry" or "Lieutenant Lunch-hunter." A senator would be outraged if he or she went to a lobbyist's feed and was given a crust of bread, a dry crust, a crumbly crust, and a glass of water. Be outraged. But again, if that senator, or anybody else, were famished, that crust going down would be the sweetest thing that person had ever eaten. That drink of water would be like the elixir of youth, so refreshing, so quenching of the thirst, it would restore that feeling of vitality in being alive. So because I cannot provide the banquet to these young women that I would like to see them have, I'm not going to say, deprive them of even a crust of bread and a glass of water. How
