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information, and you would call that number not just for the parental notification bill, but for other issues as well. And you know, that has some degree of possibility, I think. But Senator Raikes, I understand you're back in the house, and I wonder, Senator Raikes, if I could ask you a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Raikes, would you respond to a question from Senator Schimek?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Raikes, I was just trying to explain our conversation that we had yesterday, and...regarding the hot line and maybe expanding that concept. And I wondered if you had anything to add about that. I think you were engaged in conversation and didn't hear what I said, but would you like to respond at all?

SENATOR RAIKES: Senator Schimek, I did hear part of it. And I think you accurately described. We had...School Board Association has looked specifically at this issue, and basically said that their position was that no...they didn't want to be left...necessarily be left out completely. And they were in fact interested in the idea of an "800" number, or possibly a web site that would be made available in a prominent place in the school that would provide information. My suggestion would...or one of the suggestions, not necessarily mine, that came up at the meeting was that this be a broad scope of information regarding student rights, so that, for example, if there was an issue involving physical abuse by a parent, or perhaps a bullying by another student in the school, or some others that I can't think of right now, but I'm sure there are probably several, and one of them would be...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...parental notification and the judicial waiver, but that would not be the only one, that it would be a broad-based effort to provide information about students' rights
