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issues and statute regarding those rights. I do think that there was interest or support for the idea among the school boards official that was there. We haven't really had an opportunity to pursue it with other organizations.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Raikes, Senator Schimek. Senator Schimek, you are now recognized to close on AM2209, if you care to.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Senator Raikes, I was giggling a bit because we've just had a big discussion on this floor about the proper preposition to use, and you just mentioned that (laugh) there was agreement among...(laugh) I'm sorry, I've got the giggles...among the school board official. And I'm thinking, that's an interesting concept. Members, I don't know if this is the perfect solution. I am looking for a solution. I really do like what we talked about yesterday, and I think there may be some value in pursuing that angle. I would presume that such a hot line would not be housed in the Department of Health and Human Services at that point. You would probably want to house it perhaps in the...at the Department of Education. But nevertheless, I think it's a concept worth pursuing. I would like to read to you now that letter that I got from that teacher. And he is arguing that we keep the present language in statute. And again, I couldn't agree more, but sometimes political reality doesn't allow that. He says, I watched some of the abortion debate yesterday on TV. I support your efforts to keep students informed. You may or may not know this, but many of the more conservative school districts have actually skirted the student info law over the years. In our district, I can only remember once that we actually handed written info to students. And of course, whenever the word "gay" or "abortion" is mentioned, several right-wing fanatics come out of the woodwork. However, our district, upon advice of the school attorney, did this: They framed a shortened version of what we are supposed to tell students, and hung it in a very obscure corner of the school library. They even moved a potted fake tree into the corner to further make the info hard to see. A student would have had to have stumbled onto it to see it. I teach a unit on abortion law in my government class, and my students have a good laugh each
