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ask you a question or two in return, however.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, let's dialogue.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Are you worried about a counselor or a teacher who is privy to this information sharing it with a student, another teacher, CPS?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm worried about the person sharing the information with anybody. The only person that the young woman is required to give notification to if she's going to get an abortion--because that's what we're talking about--is her parent or parents or guardian. We are offering this as a chance for her to get some information through this inquiry. And if she goes to the counselor, the teacher, or whoever, that person, to use an expression, is sworn to secrecy. That person cannot tell anybody else that this young person came with the inquiry.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I agree with the concept, Senator, but I think it runs afoul of other parts of our statutes that require a counselor to report abuse. And if in the course of that conversation with that student they learn of abuse, are you saying that at that point they should not say anything?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They should not say anything about the inquiry relative to the information about the judicial waiver.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I understand that,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They could say...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...and I agree with that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that a student came to me and gave me information that indicated abuse was taking place. But that counselor would not say, the student came to me with an inquiry about obtaining information about a judicial bypass to the parental notification requirement relative to an abortion, and in the course of that discussion this is what was said. That part about the inquiry...that's why I said, if it's on the gadget,...
