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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I agree with you about the inquiry, keeping that confidential. But I'm not sure how I feel about further conversation that might reveal exactly why the student would like to use the judicial bypass.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek, the language in your amendment says, about this one employee at least, would get the information with provisions with regard to the requirements for parental notification as a condition for--and I cringe--obtaining an abortion and the provisions of these sections of statute with regard to seeking a judicial waiver of the parental notification requirements. The inquiry relates to seeking information about the judicial waiver of the parental notification requirement.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That part the person giving the information could not disclose to anybody.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I agree with that, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And I'm going to continue, in case somebody else may not have gotten the thrust of what I said because I didn't make it clear. The nature of the inquiry that this young woman is going to make relates to obtaining judicial waiver with reference to the parental notification requirement. If it's a trusted individual that the young woman goes to, maybe she will disclose information about abuse, which, as Senator Schimek correctly has pointed out, the existing law would require that adult to report to the appropriate authorities. She could...well, the counselor, whoever, may be a man. So I will say, the person to whom the young woman goes would be, if my amendment is adopted, prohibited from giving any information about the nature of the inquiry, meaning, seeking the information relative to the judicial waiver. That would not be disclosable by the one that the young woman had gone to expecting to have it kept in confidence. Since it is confidential, I don't believe that person could be compelled to disclose it. Information outside of that request is not
