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significant other or others who are or who is female join that church. I want these young women to have information. Senator Foley does not. The balance will be struck, I hope on the side of information. I have colleagues on this floor who fear to vote to retain this information and their fear is based on...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...political considerations. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. At some point I would like to discuss Senator Chambers' amendment again, but before I do that, I'd like to finish my discussion about the correspondence with the colleague, because he had a follow-up e-mail that he sent me also on Friday, and it had to do with Internet access. And he says: Even if everyone agreed that Internet access could provide a person with adequate information on legal rights and remedies, it is questionable how many people in our state actually have access to the Internet to make Internet access a meaningful source of information. There are many people that have home PCs who have access to a wide variety of information. However, there is a portion of our population who are low income who simply can't afford a computer. Are they the individuals who the law was originally intended to protect? I think this is relevant regardless of where you live. If you were to evaluate the poverty or income levels across the state, I think you would find low-income families not only in cities like Omaha or Lincoln but just about in every county in this state. It is true that, regardless of where you live, a person might have access to information at local schools or libraries. But access to information of a political or sensitive nature in those systems is another subject of debate and local policy. So in other words, we talk about the Internet access, but it might not always be available to those who need it the most. I would like to talk with Senator Chambers and just remind the body of his amendment and what the impact of it will be. And, Senator Chambers, you and I
