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Foley if that's correct.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley, would you respond?

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes. Yes, Mr. President. Senator Engel, you're absolutely correct. The current law provides that the schools must distribute the information prior to or on October 1, which is obviously very early in the school year. So for 90 percent of the school year, the law is silent. We've said nothing about what the schools may or may not do for 90 percent of the school year under current law. So if a girl gets pregnant on October 2, the schools have a free hand. They can tell her anything they want to tell her. There's no restrictions in current law and there's no restrictions in my bill. My bill does not restrict a school from doing anything. If they want to continue to pass out that piece of paper, they can, even after this bill is passed. And the opponents of this bill know that, and they have been very disingenuous about that. This bill stops nothing. It does not stop the flow of information to students. All the bill says is you don't have to pass out that piece of paper if you don't want to. If you do, fine, do it. But this bill does not stop that.

SENATOR ENGEL: Thank you, Senator Foley. And if that is the case, then I can...I don't see any reason at all for this amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Engel. Senator Schimek. This will be your third time, Senator. Senator Schimek, you're recognized, if you care to.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. Mr. President and members, I don't think I've been disingenuous, Senator Foley. As a matter of fact, I think I've been pretty up-front. I don't think that the passage of your bill is going to help disseminate that information. I think school districts will take the easy way out and they won't disseminate it at all. But that's kind of beside the point. I think that what this amendment, what my amendment would do, Senator Engel, is say that there shall be a person in that school district to whom that student may go for information. It is a requirement that they have it. As it
