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of that, yes, and the young woman did get pregnant.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And is it possible that if a young man or an older man did not run off, he would not have this kind of information to give to the young woman if she was seeking it?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: He would not have this kind of information?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is it possible that he would not have this information?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: It's possible, yes. It's probable even.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And he may not even know where to tell her to look to get this kind of information.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if your amendment were adopted, the maximum thing that a school would have to do is involve one employee in this activity. Is that true?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One or more, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, and I was going to say that's the maximum. But if a school chose to involve more than one employee, the school could do so.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: This information would have to be along the lines of that neutral information developed by the State Department of Education, even though we don't mention the state department in this amendment of yours.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, Senator, that was my intent, but because this body did not adopt your amendment, that might not be the case. Your amendment to this amendment would have provided that we, you know, involve those entities, so I'm not sure that we prescribe...we would prescribe by this amendment that we use the same form.
