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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Members of the Legislature, when we deal with young people, we often treat them as though their eyes are wide open, they know everything that needs to be known, and that they never make a mistake, they never blunder into a situation, and such being the case we come down on them with both feet, usually in a punitive manner, a manner we would not want to be applied to ourselves, a manner we would not tolerate...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...applied to ourselves. On a liquor issue, I had gotten an amendment adopted which would treat adults the way they were treating young people, and then, when adults found out what was entailed, they repealed that amendment, but I was able to defeat the bill. I wish we would not view young people as enemies or aliens, but as those who are going to take over when we're gone, and some will take over before we're gone. And it would be good if they could have been treated by us in a way that's respectful, the way a mentor would treat a mentee; not by keeping that mentee ignorant, but by presenting the information which that individual needs to make whatever the given decision is. I will repeat again, this would probably be the most important...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...decision in that young woman's life. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Senator Schimek. This will be your third time, or you may close.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. I would like to continue a little bit of a conversation with Senator Chambers, if I might.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.
