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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. Senator Chambers, I think you raised a good point a few minutes ago when you asked if this would be the same written material as is currently used, and I don't think it would. I would like to check on that. But if the body would adopt this amendment and it...we find out that it doesn't still allow the Department of Ed's information language to be used, then I would be willing, at a later time, to have an amendment made to the bill or offer that amendment myself, because that's my intent here. It's not to broaden the language that has been approved by the State Board of Education. Is that satisfactory with you, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Uh-huh.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. With that, Mr. President, are there any other lights on?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: There are no further lights, no.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, then I will also use this as my closing, and I will say that, again, this amendment, although not perfect as far as I'm concerned in that I don't think it goes far enough, it is an alternative to nothing, and it is the amendment that says that a person or persons may be designated within the school district to be available to students to under...to undertake to provide them with the information on the judicial bypass and parental notification should those students come to them with a particular situation. And I think it is...it is more than we have now because, right now, a teacher or counselor may or may not provide the information. In this case, that person who's designated, and I would make the assumption that this designated person would be willing to do that, that their responsibility would be to provide that information to the students. I think it is doable. I think it is probably not as good as existing statute, exiting language, but I would...I would say that it would be better than nothing. Thank you very much, Mr. President.
