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up--what are we going to do about safety of children in pickups? And it's time, I think, that the Legislature do take, if it needs three days on this stage, to do something about it. What Senator Aguilar is saying is 100 percent true. We have a bill in here, I think it's Senator Jensen's bill, Health and Human Services. It...can't remember the number of it, but it's supposed to be a...will be one of our big ones this year, about child safety, adding more child protective services because of the death of children, and it didn't even touch this area. We have confirmed deaths of children all the time who are not secured in their vehicles or a lot of them in riding in backs of pickups. I think this is a good bill and I'm going to support it because it is for child safety, as well as any other bill that we have for child safety. Not all of them I could support, but this one I think has been here long enough that we've got the right tool. Take whatever time we need and let's get it done. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Senator Chambers, there are no further senators wishing to address your amendment. You may close, if you care to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I do care to, Mr. President, and thank you very much. Members of the Legislature, I know my rural colleagues on occasion have been criticized by me for not being too bright. My criticism today goes beyond simply not being bright. My criticism today goes to their being unwise. We have people sitting in this Chamber, telling us that children in their area are not worthy of protection where their safety is concerned. We have a bill based on the notion that certain type of conduct can result in the death of young people. That's what the bill starts out with. The premise, the foundation, the bedrock of the bill is that certain...a certain type of activity is inherently dangerous. Therefore, any child below the age of 18, if placed in that situation, is going to result in a violation of the law by the driver of that vehicle. Having said that such conduct is unsafe, the Legislature is then asked to turn around and say, but if a child lives in a different part of the state, that child, or children, similarly situated, can be placed in those dangerous conditions, and it's all right, it doesn't violate the law.
