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ballot is being done by special interest groups who will certainly tailor the matter that's put on the ballot to their best interests, which I would expect them to do. If they're going to spend a half a million dollars or \$250 million...or \$250,000 to get something on the ballot, they're going to tailor it to the interests of those people who donate or contribute the \$250,000 or the \$500,000 to get it on the ballot. Now a lot of people don't trust the result of that kind of a question and the way that that's being presented. We are 49 elected representatives who don't have...in my view, we aren't tied to any one of those special interests. Certainly we hear from people who are involved in keno or horse racing or people in our local communities who are involved and support the local keno operation or the benefits of the lottery and that kind of thing, but we are elected representatives to represent all the people and this, if we're ever going to have this kind of thing in the state, it ought to be regulated, controlled, defined by this body. If you give that up and say, well, there's a process out there, let them do a petition, we are...we are...we are ignoring our elected responsibility. There's enough interest in this state for the question to get on the ballot. It ought to get on the ballot and it ought to be on the ballot in such a way that it's sensible, it's controllable by this body. And then we're accountable for the legislation we pass, and we can change it if we make a mistake. And the only...the only thing that makes any sense at all for not supporting something this sensible is if you just simply don't want to give the people a chance to vote on any issue related to casino gambling. If you don't want that to happen, you can vote against this. But bear in mind that \$500,000 or \$750,000 will put something on the ballot, probably, and then you're going to have to live with it, and you're probably not going to have a whole lot of control when that happens. So I think we're being very shortsighted if we oppose something like this, even if we're opposed to the proposition of more gambling. The people will speak on that. This elected body will regulate that if we do it the right way. And I think...I think...I have confidence in this body. I don't think that any casino is going to elect enough people to this body to influence the outcome in the decisions that we make. If it does, then there's something a whole lot more wrong than...
