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SENATOR ERDMAN: So then is it your vision, then, that the other six outside of those large destination casinos would be something a little smaller in scope? Is that why we're going to eight in the constitutional amendment? Or...?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I don't have a vision exactly about that, Senator Erdman. And in fact, that would probably be all I'd do if it were up to me. But I think that it would give the opportunity for, say, racetracks to come in and make their case, or for a location in western Nebraska to come in and make their case. It would allow different people to make their cases, and then the Legislature would have to decide.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Okay. What's the definition of a casino?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Let me find my green copy.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Okay. And as you're looking for that, as I read this, it defines what gaming is, and then it refers to a casino without any direct...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: You're right. It doesn't have a definition of a casino in here.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And that was...I mean, that was kind of deliberate.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That would be up to us to define at a later date.

SENATOR ERDMAN: So realistically, a casino could be, if the Legislature chose and was so inclined to do so, a room in a downtown area that had slot machines in it.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. But that would take up one of those eight locations.
