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who I have a lot of respect for. The compulsive gambling people do a great job with their limited resources that they have. And that percentage that goes to compulsive gambling would not change. We would have more dollars, of course, to combat the problems of...that the compulsive gamblers are faced with. I've seen people get addicted on just the pickle tickets. I know in one particular situation, I watched a person go through a lot of money before he finally sought help and was given help. The older gentleman was retired and he got...that got started on this and it is a disease, just like anything else. But it's been with us, that's what I'm trying to say, it's been with us for so long, and that percentage is going to stay the same. From 3 to 5 percent of the people are going to be addicted to gambling or games of chance. I've seen people get addicted to playing bingo, for heaven sakes. I know one lady that would drive hundreds of miles just to find a bingo parlor that suited her needs. She never missed, probably didn't win a lot but she loved to do that, and probably was addicted to that. So I, with all the respect in the world for Mr. Bauerkemper, he knows what he's talking about. This is what he does. He has worked with it for years. I don't know whether he enjoys his job or not, but he does a good job at answering. And the hot lines that...now Iowa has a hot line, but if you have people in Omaha that are being addicted from the out-of-state gaming, they are not going to call that Iowa hot line. They are going to call the Nebraska hot line. And here we are trying to fund those people or that organization through the scratch-off tickets and the lottery proceeds, and so on, which we have tried to maintain and keep up. I know Senator Smith had a bill a few years ago that pumped a little more money back into the fund, the compulsive gambling fund, and it was fine. You know, we needed to do this, but there we were going. We were robbing from Peter to pay Paul, because that was about the time that the casinos in Omaha really got rolling. And go back, you know, and we're about 12 years too late. I remember sitting down where Senator Loudon sits right now and Senator Hall sat...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...where Senator Synowiecki sat, and he had a bill in to put gaming at the old Ak-Sar-Ben, you know. And
