Board will set up those rules and regs.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: And how would a business that's currently in operation, how would they have to document that they've had 6,000 hours?

SENATOR STUHR: Well, they would certainly have to have something in writing that documents that they have been in business, you know, for that length of time. They would have to have some records of being paid to, you know, to have performed that service for that, you know, length of time. So it doesn't exactly...and that's my fault in not explaining that quite correctly, as far as that 6,000 hours, because the training will be prescribed by the Health and Human Services in the rules and regs that they set up.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: And you...at this time you don't have any idea how many hours that is, or...?

SENATOR STUHR: No,...

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Okay.

SENATOR STUHR: ...I don't. But there would have to be, I'm sure, some requirements on how they use the equipment, if they, you know, they know what procedures to use. And the reason we've put it under the Cosmetology Act is because we felt this was the most appropriate board without setting up another entire bureaucracy, so to speak, that this could certainly be included. And there are a number of other areas that are included under the Board of Cosmetology.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, thank you for the clarification, Senator Stuhr. And our...the Legislature's very own "Nostradamus," I understand, may have an amendment on the training. So we'll see if that comes up. Would you like any time?

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you.
