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Senator Stuhr, your light is next.

SENATOR STUHR: Okay. Thank you. I do just...I do appreciate the discussion that we have had, because I do think that much of this discussion talks about whether artists are reputable or not. And this has seemed to be a problem. I've certainly received a lot of mail and phone calls, many people who take advantage of our youth when it comes to tattooing and piercing and branding. And I know that there are many reputable artists, but unfortunately, there are many that are not reputable out in our communities. So our research indicates that there are probably about 40 body art businesses in Nebraska. And again, I...the reason I introduced this bill is being concerned about the sanitary conditions, knowing and wanting these people to have clean facilities, sanitary facilities. And about the only way that we can make sure that this is done is through a licensing and regulation of the practitioners and also the facility. So I'd certainly be happy to answer any other questions. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Stuhr, it happens by chance that, as I was indicating to Senator Jensen earlier, that I just finished reading a book about the voyages of Captain Cook, who, at about the time of the American Revolution, was scanning the Pacific Ocean for new islands and new lands to claim for the British Empire. And as his sailors came into contact with they Polynesian people, they learned the word "tattoo," which is from the Pacific area. And the peoples of Polynesia were very much culturally into tattooing. They tattooed all parts of their bodies, huge tattoos everywhere, and a very sophisticated art was a part of that culture. But I mention that because I just want to feel comfortable that we're separating what's medically appropriate...what's appropriate for medical reasons from our ideas of fashion or our ideas of aesthetics. And I very much appreciate the fact that parental consent should be acquired before a child does something as permanent as a tattoo. And on page 27, I was just looking at some of the requirements. You need to have the written and notarized consent of the parent or court-appointed guardian. I assume it has to be notarized
