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individuals in the practice of and entities in the business of body art, cosmetology, electrology, emergency medical services, esthetics, funeral directing. I understand, yeah, there's some...probably some missing pieces to the puzzle, like some folks have brought up here already. But I don't believe that I have the same concerns. Senator Bourne was curious about what part of the body thought about this, and those are my initial thoughts. And that's it, Mr. Speaker. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Friend. Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I would just draw your attention to Section 34, which does talk about the requirements and the rules and regs that will be adopted under this act. And I did share with you earlier that they have to be at least 18 years of age, have a high school diploma, pass an examination approved, administered, or recognized by the Board of Cosmetology; for body piercing, complete training under the direct supervision of a person in the state designated by the board or equivalent training in another jurisdiction approved by the board; for branding, complete training, again, under the direct supervision of a person in the state designated by the board. So again, there would be someone that has worked in that area and approved by the board. Again, for the color technology and for tattooing, again, complete training under the direct supervision of a tattoo artist in the state designated by the board. And applicants for licensure must pass a practical examination conducted by the board to test the applicant's knowledge of infection control practices and requirements, including appropriate safety, sanitation, and sterilization techniques. And persons performing body art prior to January 1, 2005, may continue to practice for 90 days after such date if they apply for license with the Department of Health and Human Services, and within that period, and provide documentation of the...and that's where it talks about the 6,000 hours of experience. Going back to the notarization and why we were requiring parents, to date there are 31 states that have laws prohibiting adolescents from getting tattoos, 31 states that prohibit anyone 18 or under. And so what we were trying to do is at least include the...allowing them...this to happen, but to have
