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blood-borne diseases, you have to think process. That's just like our blood-borne pathogen standard that we have for universal precautions. We have to think process-oriented on that particular issue, because the outcome is not always evident until many years down the line. So perhaps that helps clarify it a little bit, where they're going with that medically. And then from the acute side, as far as, you know, opposed to the chronic, the acute, I would say the acute problems would probably be more inclusive of things like infection or, you know, other things that can happen by having unclean procedures. And thank you, and I'll give my time remaining to Senator Bourne, if he would like to respond.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Combs.

SPEAKER BROMM: You have two minutes, Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you. Senator Combs, I appreciate your comments. That does help a bit. But again, what I'm trying to do is balance the interests or the protection of the state with adding new, more regulations. And I would assume, you know, you're going to add another...I don't know if you're going to add people to the department of cosmetology (sic) to handle this. And so I do have a concern with our overregulation. And I will tell you, the amendment that Senator Stuhr is proposing to the committee amendment adds some language that any person who performs any or all of the practices of body art, even without compensation, would be subject to this...the rules of this act, as I'm reading it. So I think this is a concern, that we haven't seen the harm, other than some anecdotal evidence from parents who complain, and rightfully so, that their kids are getting piercings without their knowledge or permission. And we should stop that...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...activity, there's no doubt in my mind. But I'm not sure that we need to go as far as adopting a whole new set of regulations, additional government, perhaps additional people in the department of cosmetology (sic) or the Department of HHS to regulate an industry that we're not...that's right,
